


Volunteers, please

The Club Championship Final on 6th September will be contested by two in-form players – William Squires will play Mark Durham over 36-holes. The "B" Championship is between Mikey Taylor and Graham Campbell, while Colin MacLaine awaits the winner of Peter Thompson & Jim Dewar in the "C" Championship.

Up until the last week or so, the weather has been on our side, and after a bit of reshuffling initially, and a few tweaks along the way, I'm hopeful that all trophies will have a 2020 name on them. I'd not have believed that in June!

The August Medal needed a second attempt and the Captain's Cup was played on a number of temporary greens due to torrential rain, but otherwise the course has been in magnificent condition.

We are averaging almost 50 players per competition which is very healthy and has also meant that we have contributed more than $\pounds1,000$ back into club funds along the way.

We had the rarest of rare events in the Ben Nicholson Trophy on the 16th August. Not one, but **two** holes-in-one were recorded. Lee Gourlay holed his tee shot on the 16th and within an hour Christopher Wilson had done the very same on the 13th.

Also, this was a first hole-in-one for both players.

Rumour has it that Lee's playing partners, James Jamieson & Darren Gourlay, made it from the 16th green to the bar at world record pace.

Congratulations to both of you - well done, lads!

Extension of the Club to 18 holes Stage 2

In Stage 1, as described in the last Newsletter, we had made a deal to buy part of Loch Fergus Farm which has gone to make up what are now all of the 5th, 6th and 7th holes, the parts of the 9th and 12th that are south of the pond at the 9th, all of the 13th and the 14th tee. Much still needed to be done to get enough ground for an 18 hole course that combined the 9 holes that we had with the new land we had purchased.

After long negotiations, we were able to buy a section of the forestry ground which is now the northern part of the 4th hole. They would have preferred for us to buy the whole forest, but our finances were never going to stretch that far.

The part of the 14th in the dip off the tee was a pig farm belonging to the late George Nicholson. Fortunately he had been a golfer (a pretty useful one at that), and he let us have it at a reasonable price.

Boreland

We managed to get a lease on land of the Boreland Farm from the Common Good Fund, and this has been developed into the 10th, the 11th, most of the 9th, and the 12th tee.

Even then, we didn't have quite enough, and Donald had to go back and buy a further 5 acres to make what is now the 8th hole. David met with Alex Smith who was to do the fencing, and the instruction was that the fence was to go up the line through the <u>knowes</u> that border the 8th fairway. However, Alex pointed out that you couldn't put <u>stobs</u> in the knowes, and it would have to be either the top of the knowes or the bottom. We opted for the top, as otherwise there was a strong likelihood of cattle damaging the fence. We had to pay for another 2 acres, but looking at it now, it was money well spent.

The next Newsletter will have details of the building of the course.
