Captain's Christmas Log

STAR DATE: 2STH DECEMBER, 2020

I think 2020 may go down as one of the toughest years in the Club's recent history, but certainly the strangest. In my first year as captain, we've had to deal with a 10 week lockdown with the course closed, two greens staff on fur-

lough, a burst pipe above the office which caused significant damage to our electrical estate and the fabric of the building, severe restrictions that had a major impact on visitor numbers, particularly when the weather was at its finest, reduced use of the lounge, and to top it all, when we came out of lockdown, my handicap was 10.3, and now I'm playing off 15 under WHS.



I'd like to thank the 33 members who logged into our virtual AGM, only 3 less than last year, and report that everything went well with approving the subscription increases, which means we have a chance to deliver on the planned budget. Having proposed a cap of £15 increase for 2021 when we agreed the £20 increase last year, I'm pleased that we were able to carry that through.

I do appreciate that some may say that as the course was closed during lockdown, that there was a case to limit the increase even more, but we felt that we could not cut expenditure on the course, and our analysis suggests that in fact members played more often in the weeks when the course was open than the year before. I have already played 6 more rounds in 2020 than I did in 2019.

It is always a balancing act, and we are well aware that if we charge too much, we lose members and actually get less income. I don't think anyone would have predicted the largest net increase in membership for several years. Our challenge now is to retain them, and get back a few more who didn't renew by providing a continually improving product, namely the course.

It's really important that I give thanks to the whole membership. I can report that remarkably, not a single member asked for a refund of their fees during lockdown, and every single person who pays monthly kept their payments going without a break. This is simply not the case at a number of clubs, and many have had to go cap in hand to their members for help, so I salute all of you for your support.

In spite of the greens staff being furloughed in the initial lockdown, the course was presented to us on our return looking magnificent and has been the subject of much praise from members and visitors alike, so thank you again to John and his team. Ultimately, it is you who deliver our product. I should also say that one constant theme from our visitors this year has been their praise for the warmth of the welcome they received, so thanks to everyone, in particular our office staff, and also to everyone who has had a hand in sanitising buggies.

So we now look forward to 2021 with a vaccine on the horizon, a rebuilt club office, a course that continues to improve from the targeted investments that we are making, the return of Open competitions and the possibility of more new members and visitors.



I'd also like to give a heads-up that we will be hoping to make a start this year at fundraising to support the costs of refurbishing the lounge and bringing it into the 21st Century. Ideally we'd like to start work next winter. Financially that might not be possible, but we're going to start by forming a group to start looking at the requirements and the design, so anyone with the skills to contribute, please step forwards. What we do will probably need to last 20+ years. I think we all know that the lounge has the feel of a 1960s working men's club and rather lets down the course, but equally, none of our visitors has ever come off the course and said they won't come back because of the state of the lounge. We must keep it in perspective, and not put ourselves into debt, so I expect the burden will mostly fall on the successors of myself and Hilary, but hopefully we can make a start this year.

Thanks everyone for your support and for the frequent kind words, and I trust that everyone has a lovely Christmas break, hopefully with your families where possible, and a peaceful New Year. It will be nice to see everyone out in January with their new toys and looking forward to getting to grips with whatever WHS throws at us.

We will review just how that will work nearer the time, perhaps by February /March. We will produce a new fixture list, similar to the one we had hoped to use this year and keep our fingers crossed.

One further change for the ladies next year is for us all to have a Competition Purse on the Club system, HandicapMaster. It will be used to take entry money from and deposit winnings into. More details to follow in the New Year.

On behalf of the Ladies I would like to thank John Houston and his team for the way they have presented the course this year. It has been a joy to play. Thanks also goes to the office staff for all their help, especially Steve Richardson who never once looked frustrated when I came in with yet another question. A Review of 2020...

It's fair to say that 2020 wasn't exactly the season we were hoping or planning for, but from a playing point of view it turned out well in the end. Apart from the Springbank & AC Brown Matchplay events, we managed to squeeze all trophy competitions into a shortened season.

When we restarted around mid-June, we all had to get used to some additional measures put in place for our safety. Putting with the pin in was frustrating for some, but for the most part everyone was just really happy to be out playing again. Marking our own scorecards is a bit different and personally I miss shaking hands at the end of a game but all the small things we do now can make a difference in the longer term.

The online prize-purse system has been a great help to me, and I think that the tee booking system has been a real success too. Both required a lot of work from Steve to get these up and running as quickly and seamlessly as he did. There has been a lot of positive feedback on the booking system even if it was born out of necessity, and it's something that I'd fully support continuing with even when we do return to 'normal' eventually.

The Winter League is now under way and we have continued with the "old" CONGU Handicapping System. The simple reason for this is that it allows us to make temporary handicap adjustments while we move on and off a shortened course through the winter.



I'm sure we will all get used to the new World Handicap System in time for the 2021 season. Given time, I think it will prove to be a big improvement to the game. I guess we will find out!

Look out for some new competitions next season – The Champions Trophy will be an end of season competition for all trophy winners throughout the season, and we will play for the Eric Guthrie Putter, in Eric's memory, open to Ladies & Gents.

Finally, the smooth running of the club, depends on a team of volunteers giving up their own time. I'd like to thank everyone who has helped in any way, big or small. It's always appreciated.

During the Sam Ironmonger Memorial EGGS competition on 20th October, Dave Harris was the latest Kirkcudbright golfer to achieve a Hole-In-One. This was at the 16th hole playing with (and kindly photographed by) Colin Kennedy and Jim Judge. As the flag was at the front of the green, none of the group saw the ball go in but Dave thought he'd hit it well and would get close and so did Jim. Walking down the hill, they noticed that there were two balls on the green, one much closer than the other. Then they noticed something very close to hole but couldn't tell if it was a ball or a leaf or just the sunlight reflecting off the white sides of the hole. Discussing whether or not it was a ball as they descended, they were obviously watching where they were walking and literally (literally) took their eye off the ball. When Colin looked at the hole again, the white thing had disappeared. They all agreed that it must have been a ball and that it was balanced at the back of the cup between the flag and the edge of the hole, and that it must have fallen in when the wind blew the flag and the flagstick moved. Colin thought his ball was the furthest away but Dave and Jim didn't know whose ball it was that had dropped (gripping stuff, eh? [Ed]). View From The Office

1. Office Refurbishment

We are part way through refurbishment thanks to Tommy Learmonth, Allan Breckenridge, Robin Murray and Brian McQuarrie, who have been working hard fitting it in round their normal lives. Hopefully we will be back in it from the start of next year. Many thanks to those who made donations towards this, which has supplemented the insurance claim.

2. Buggies

We are purchasing a third single buggy thanks to a grant from the R&A. This one will be fitted with lithium batteries and is the start of transitioning the whole buggy fleet to the lithium option. Though more expensive the warranty and expected life of these batteries is much longer and the weight reduction is significant, especially for double buggies. This means the buggies will do less damage to the course and be useable in more marginal conditions, which is an important part of keeping our members playing.

3. <u>Membership</u>

We benefitted from the increased interest in golf after the lockdown and have had just over 50 new members during 2020. Although this was only a net increase of about 15 it is the first increase in membership for several years. We hope to be able to run a membership campaign next April, presuming the course and Clubhouse are reasonably freely available.

4. Golf Club software

We are still using HandicapMaster for now, including their tee booking system (having ended our relationship with BRS/Golf Now/TeeTimes.com). Both members and visitors have found tee booking relatively straightforward and not too much of a pain. The transition to the World Handicap System has gone ok, with some teething problems. If you notice an issue with any rounds you have played and how they appear on the Scottish Golf App or website or HandicapMaster please let us know and we should be able to resolve it .

5. Volunteers

I'm indebted to the many people helping in the Office and around the Clubhouse. It is the difference between surviving and thriving and I get a very positive sense of how well we are supporting both our members and visitors. Thank you all.

For those golf clubs who **have** a COVID Officer and applicable risk assessments: Groups of up to 4 golfers with no restrictions on number of households.

For those golf clubs who **do not have** a COVID Officer and applicable risk assessments: Groups of up to 4 golfers with up to two households represented.

Anyone wishing to step up and take on this task, please contact the office. The same restrictions apply in Tier 3.
